TORONTO – the Mecca of cricket in the Americas

The City of Toronto is best known for having the tallest free standing structure in the world – the CN Tower, which stands 553 m (1,815 ft.) tall – but the city is quickly becoming the Mecca for cricket in the Americas. If anyone is wondering why, consider the following:

- There are over 200 cricket teams and fifty cricket grounds in or around the city.
- Ten grounds with turf wickets (six currently active) and an ODI approved facility, with one more well on its way.
- Warm temperatures (high 20s to low 30s C) and very little rainfall are reasons enough to attract cricket events to the city.
- Toronto is the capital city of the Province of Ontario which boasts a stronger economy than any of the G8 nations and that includes the USA.
- With exceptional value for hotel accommodation, meals and easy air access, Toronto has become the choice for major international events of the region.

Starting July 29 for one month, three major events will be held in and around Toronto



- 1. The Intercontinental Cup (a four day first class event) will kick off the month long international scene.
 - Canada will take on Kenya from July 29 to August 1 at Maple Leaf Cricket Club in King City.
 - Bermuda comes in to play Canada at the same venue August 12 to 15.
- 2. Six ODI matches involving Kenya, Bermuda and Canada will be played at the Toronto Cricket Skating and Curling Club in August.
- 3. Starting August 21, five countries (Argentina, Bermuda, Canada, Cayman Islands and the USA) will compete for the Americas Championship. The real award however, will be the spot available in Division 3 of the World Cricket League. With Canada and Bermuda already in Division 1 and the USA in Division 3, it really is a fight between Argentina and Cayman Islands for the one place available.

ICC Announces World Twenty20 Championship

The Stanford 20/20 is ready to go in a few days in the Caribbean, two Americas Region teams, Bahamas and Cayman Islands will tangle in round one set for Antigua early July. Maybe this will prove to be a good training session for the WI team to the World Championship in 2007.

The ICC Twenty20 World Championship will begin in September 2007 with a 12-team nine day event in South Africa. United Cricket Board of South Africa Chairman Ray Mali thanked the ICC for awarding the event to South Africa.

The second ICC Twenty20 World Championship will take place in England in June 2009. David Morgan, Chairman of the England and Wales

Cricket Board said the event would be the centerpiece of the summer calendar.

The frequency of the ICC Twenty20 World Championship beyond 2009 will be determined once an evaluation of the initial events has been undertaken.

As well as harnessing the international enthusiasm for Twenty20 cricket by unanimously agreeing to introduce a Twenty20 World Championship, the ICC Board has also put controls on the format's expansion by limiting sides to a maximum of three home matches per season.


The decisions taken during a meeting of the ICC Board in Dubai are subject to ratification at the ICC's Annual Conference in London in July.

BERMUDA

Bermuda in the UK

Bermuda's national team is on their third international tour in less than a year. On May 31 Sussex 2nd X1 defeated the touring squad by 7 wickets – Bermuda 137 (Dean Minors 40), Sussex 139/3.

Bermuda continued their tour of the UK with a victory over Lloyds and retained the Catlin Cup which the two sides compete for on an annual basis – Bermuda 218/8 (T.Gibbons 53, I. Romaine 56), Lloyds 214/6.

Bermuda defeated Guernsey by 5 wickets. Guernsey were all out for 170. Bermuda passed the target score with 5 wickets in hand. Irving Romaine with 57 n.o led the way with George O'Brien contributing 36. Saleem Mukuddem took 3/27.

Bermuda won their third match of the current tour by defeating Guernsey 225-178. Delyone Borden with an outstanding innings of 71 was top scorer, while Saleem Mukuddem captured 3 wickets for 27 runs.

Skipper Janeiro Tucker with 93 and Delyone Borden with 42 runs led Bermuda to an easy 97 run victory over the Guernsey President's X1. Scores were Bermuda 215/9 and Guernsey 118. Hasan Durham took 3/7 in six overs.

CCA President receives Award

CWC 2007

The CCA President and other CCA executives met recently with a visiting delegation from the St. Lucia Tourist Board and the country's Local Operating Committee for the 2007 ICC Cricket World Cup to discuss possible future cooperation in several areas. Canada will be playing its CWC 2007 Group Stage games in St. Lucia on March 14, 18 & 22, 2007.



Ontario captures Eastern Canadian Title

Ontario, led by George Codrington, captured the Atholstan Trophy, symbol of cricket supremacy in Eastern Canada, when they defeated Quebec by 106 runs at Waterloo Park on June 10/11. Ontario won the toss and elected to bat, scoring 141 runs. Quebec answered with 127 runs. In their second innings, Ontario rattled up 177 runs for the loss of 9 wickets to lead by 191 runs, and in reply Quebec could only muster a modest 85 runs. Main destroyer for Ontario was left-arm spinner Ravishankar Puvendram who bagged 5/39 and 4/33.

A large crowd attended the event which was staged to help promote the growing popularity of the sport in the city of Toronto and the organizers were delighted with the turn out.

TURKS & CAICOS

<u>Caribbean Cavaliers win Provo cricket</u> <u>competition</u>

Caribbean Cavaliers won the Providenciales Cricket Association's latest competition when they

defeated Jamaican All Stars by three wickets in the final. All Stars rattled up 193 for 8 from their allotted 30 overs, and the Cavaliers replied with 195 for 7 in 28 overs.

The Jamaicans slumped to 60 for 6, but an unbeaten innings of 80 by opening batsman Vincent Francis ensured they recovered to post a competitive score. For the Cavaliers, David Foster claimed four wickets for 23 runs and Howard Dickenson three for 20.

Cavaliers in reply were soon struggling at 64 for 4 before the innings was steadied by skipper Shawn Khan who made 65 before he was dismissed in the 26th over.

Robert Johnson claimed two wickets for 25 runs for the All Star team.

Cavaliers captain Khan collected the winner's trophy from the association's President, Claude Swann.

Prizes were also presented to Juwan Bud-in-ayake and Dickenson who scored the most runs and claimed the most wickets respectively.

U.S.A.

<u>USACA National Junior Tournament ends on a high</u>

Ten teams from eight cricket regions nationally participated in the four day, 23 game tournament played at Stanford, Santa Clara, Cupertino and San Jose. Hosts California Cricket Academy

won the U-11, U-13 Championships while North West Centurions won the U-15.

Game rules were clearly laid out well in advance, neutral umpires officiated at the games, extensive use of technology helped teams get ball-by-ball statistics at any point in time, and grounds teams ensured that games started and ended on time. California Cricket Academy gave out a total of 75 individual performance awards, apart from the winners and runners-up trophies. Every participant went home with a tournament memorabilia and every coach and manager a gift basket. Visitors and players enjoyed the hospitality.

World Cup accommodation crisis



The Caribbean will not be able to cope with the demand generated by up to 100,000 people who are planning to travel to watch the World Cup, according to Chris Dehring, the tournament's director.

"We don't expect to satisfy the entire demand," Dehring admitted. "You can't. It is a tremendous amount of demand for the World Cup. Those who want to attend must appreciate that it is really going to be a challenge.

"They need to get out there and book their flights and hotel accommodations very early. They should have done so already, [but] it's not too late."

Dehring explained that a number of initiatives were being investigated to try to alleviate the situation, including accommodation offshore on cruise ships.
